DEAR READERS, COLLEAGUES, FRIENDS!

The basic condition for implementing the scientific and technological potential of Russia is a stable system of intellectual property.

The main topic of the new issue of the journal, i. e. comparative approaches to legal regulation and law enforcement practice in the Russian Federation and abroad, is disclosed in a series of publications by authors with extensive practical experience in the field of intellectual property.

The methodological aspects of the legal regulation of the problems of registration of trademarks, which elements are the previously registered trademarks of other persons, are considered in the article by O. Alekseeva, the head of the FIPS Quality Monitoring Center. The author gives a retrospective analysis of the development of the methodology, formulating in fine the proposals for amending paragraph 10 of Article 1483 of the Civil Code of the Russian Federation and a number of other regulations in a form of draft legal acts, taking into account, among other things, the approaches of the Court for Intellectual Property Rights.

The conducted comparative analysis leads the author to the conclusion that the national methodology for assessing the similarity of marks, like the foreign one, simulates the perception of the consumer's mark, and at the same time, the Russian regulation is unique.

In the new issue of the journal, we drew attention to the problem of author's remuneration payment, which is one of the key issues in the creation and subsequent use of employee's results of intellectual activity (RIA). This topic is covered in the article by O. Diachenko and S. Tuzova, where an overview of the legislative regulation in Russia and the EAEU countries is given, as well as the practices of the Russian and foreign universities are analyzed.

Of undoubted interest is the experience of the PRC Patent Office on examination and implementation of measures to stimulate inventive activity in the field of "green" technologies. The article by G. Negulyaev considers said issue.

In developing the theme of international practice in the field of intellectual property, we continue our traditional rubric "News of patent offices of foreign states", which contains information about

the main events of the patent offices of China, Japan, South Korea and other countries of Eastern Asia: vivid examples from the practice of intellectual property protection and enforcement, information about people who have made special contributions to said field and their activities, including books and articles in periodicals, as well as statistics on intellectual property protection, innovative activity, legal precedents, etc. Each news is provided with a link to the source.

Paying attention to foreign practices, our journal offers unique material on the state of intellectual property in the Eurasian space. The new issue presents material on the dynamics of application filings in the Republic of Tajikistan.

Innovative practices in the field of intellectual property are presented by young authors M. Doroshenko, V. Klementiev and M. Gavrikov.

An overview of the most significant publications in the field of Artificial Intelligence is provided by the Department for Research Centers in the field of Artificial Intelligence of the Analytical Center under the Government of the Russian Federation jointly with the National Center for the Development of Artificial Intelligence under the Government of the Russian Federation.

The nature of inventive activity, changes in the society caused by patenting and implementation of new inventions, these are the issues reviewed in the book "Symbols and Narratives" by G. Ivliev, that we pitch on the pages of our journal.

We sincerely congratulate our colleagues from Tajikistan on the occasion of the 30th anniversary of the National Patent Information Center! We wish a steady growth in patent applications, success in solving the problems of intellectual property protection and enforcement on the way to achieving the goals on developing the national system of intellectual property.
